A Message from the President

One of the thrills of becoming a doctor is the awareness that medical knowledge is constantly evolving. Involvement in research as a doctor is not compulsory, but on a personal level I do not believe you can be a great doctor without being research involved. The most fundamental level of research involvement is the application of evidence into daily practice – an area which is a challenge but helped so much by initiatives such as the Cochrane Collaboration (now freely available in Malaysia). The next level is measuring whether we are adhering to evidence-based practice through clinical audit.

I sometimes hear of doctors doubting whether they can be research active. I was in full time specialist clinical practice for 16 years before entering academia and managed to carry out some interesting research studies. Prof John Howie was the first Professor of General Practice in the UK and in 1979 stated "25,000 general practitioners and their aggregate of unanswered questions remains one of the most significant sources of research potential available to contemporary medicine".

I believe this is still true today – each time you see a patient and reflect on the best course of action for that person, and search the established databases and find no clarity, throws up a new research question. Next time, instead of dismissing your thoughts, write them down, formulate a research question and share it with colleagues or with RUMC. Several of my best pieces of research arose in this way!


RUMC is now able to supervise PhD candidates, registering them with RCSI or UCD. We are also developing a MSc by research. Feel free to enquire further.



Who Are We?

Many of you will know that Cochrane's main work is producing high quality systematic reviews aimed at helping people, (healthcare professionals, policy makers and patients), make healthcare decisions based on the best available research evidence. Cochrane originally started in Oxford UK in 1993, and is now a global collaboration involving over 50,000 people.

Cochrane got its name from Archie Cochrane, an epidemiologist best known for his book, "Effectiveness and Efficiency: Random Reflections on Health Services". In this book advocated for randomised-controlled trials as a means of immoving efficiency and efficiency improving effectiveness and efficiency in healthcare. In 1979 he said, "It is surely a great criticism of our profession that we have not organised a critical summary, by specialty or subspecialty, adapted periodically, of all relevant randomised controlled

This challenge was accepted in the 1980's, initially as the Oxford Database of Perinatal Trials, eventually becoming the Cochrane Collaboration, now consisting of 53 specialty groups, methods groups, 43 geographic centres and other collaborators in 130 countries. The critical summary referred to by Archie Cochrane is now the systematic review. An important feature of Cochrane is its culture of being free from commercial interest, counterbalancing the research done in the pharmaceutical and medical device industries by creating an independent assessment of what the research tells us.

Cochrane in Malaysia

Back in 2003 there were three Cochrane authors in Malaysia but Cochrane authors in Malaysia but today, we have more than 320 active authors and over 160 review documents on the Cochrane Library. Many other Malaysians are involved in Cochrane in various other ways and we currently now have over 1,000 Malaysian Cochrane members. This massive growth reflects Malaysia's interest in contributing to and using the best available evidence.

In mid-October 2020 we reached another important milestone. We obtained free full-text access to the Cochrane Library right across Malaysia from any computer with a Malaysian IP address. This access is provided by the National Institutes of Health, MOH. Tan Sri Datuk


